NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting and BBQ are scheduled for <u>Saturday</u>, May 14, 2016 at 11:00 AM. This is the official notice of that meeting. It will be held at Hedrick Ranch Nature Area, 20385 South Mountain Road, Santa Paula, CA. This is the place we held the annual meeting for years until the last few when it was in use by the farm. **Directions:** Take Hwy 126 to Santa Paula, 10th St. Exit. Go under freeway, rt. on Harvard, rt. on 12th and cross the S.C. River Bridge. Go 3.7 miles to 20395 S. Mountain Rd. Turn left onto the dirt road & follow it to the end (approx. ½ mile). As usual, we shall do some birding beforehand starting at 9:00 am. The price this year will be \$15.00 per person (half price for children under 12).

Please send your reservation with check to Marianne Slaughter at P.O. Box 24198, Ventura, CA 93002 by May 6th. Or, you may call Marianne (805-484-8415) with your reservation and pay at the BBQ. The menu will include chicken, tri-tip, veggie beans, two salads, garlic bread and special steamed vegetables for our vegetarian members. Please bring your own plates and utensils (to reduce trash) and an appetizer or dessert to share. You may also bring your own beverage including beer and wine. VAS will provide water. NOTES FROM THE FIELD ...David Pereksta

FEBRUARY 2016

The most exciting report of February was a **Blue-footed Booby** found on Anacapa Island during a pelagic trip on 27 Feb (JB et al.). This is the first **Blue-footed Booby** to be seen with the recent large influx of **Brown Boobies** to the island. Numbers of **Brown Boobies** continued at Anacapa Island through 27 Feb with a high of 128 on 10 Feb (JH). A

Thayer's Gull was also at Anacapa Island on 3 Feb (DP).

Two **Snow Geese** were at the Simi Hills Neighborhood Park on 27 Feb (DP) and one was at Lake Casitas 7-11 Feb (KR). As many as three **Cackling Geese** continued in Simi Valley through 26 Feb. The **Longtailed Duck** continued in the Channel Islands Harbor through 6 Feb. After an absence of the species in January, **American White Pelicans** reappeared at several locations including one at the Ventura Settling Ponds on 22 Feb (BH), four at Point Mugu on 26 Feb (M. Obs), two at Lake Casitas on 27 Feb (AF & KL), six at the Santa Clara River Estuary

on 28 Feb (BT), and one over Camarillo on 29 Feb (DP). A **Reddish Egret** and at



least 20 **Yellow-crowned Night-Herons** continued at Mugu Lagoon through 26 Feb. Two **Sandhill Cranes** were a rare local find at Lake Casitas 27-29 Feb (LF) and the pair of **Bald Eagles** continued there through Feb.

Long-tailed Duck

A few notable passerines and other perching birds were reported in February. Two White-winged Doves continued in Camarillo through 4 Feb. Simi Hills Neighborhood Park hosted a variety of uncommon or rare woodpeckers including a Williamson's Sapsucker on 13 Feb (ET), a "Yellow-shafted" Northern Flicker 13-26 Feb (ET), and a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker on 27 Feb (DP). A Vermilion Flycatcher continued at Point Mugu through 19 Feb. A Golden-crowned Kinglet was at Valle Lindo Park on 29 Feb (DP). The Black-and-white Warbler reported at Valle Lindo Park since December was found to be two different birds on 17 Feb (AS). Another Black-and-white Warbler continued at Marion Cannon Park in Ventura through 10 Feb. Sparrows of

note included the continuing **Field Sparrow** in Ojai through Feb 28, a **Swamp Sparrow** at the Ventura Settling Ponds on 2 Feb (FD), and a continuing **White-throated Sparrow** in Camarillo through 2 Feb.

APRIL FIELD TRIPS ... Karin Kersteter

Beginners are welcome on all field trips. Light drizzle does not necessarily cancel trips, but heavier rain will. If in doubt, please call the trip leader. For all trips, please wear appropriate clothing (layers are suggested), comfortable shoes, and bring snacks, water, hats, sunscreen, binoculars and field guides. Carpooling is offered for many trips, but is not guaranteed. If you arrive at the carpool spot and no one is there, please proceed to the trip location.

Saturday, April 2, 8:00 a.m. Work Day Hedrick Ranch Nature Area. Leader: Sandy Hedrick (805) 340-0478. Arrive at 8:00 for self-guided birding which usually yields some interesting birds. Work from 9am – noon. Long pants and boots or closed shoes are required. Bring water, gloves & sun protection. Directions: Take Hwy 126 to Santa Paula, 10th St. Exit. Go under freeway, rt. on Harvard, rt. on 12th and cross the S.C. River Bridge. Go 3.7 miles to 20395 S. Mountain Rd. Turn left onto the dirt road & follow it to the end (approx. ½ mile). Even a little rain can make the road impassible; if in doubt, call Sandy to check road conditions.

Saturday, April 9, 8:30 a.m. Taft Gardens. Leader: John Pavelko (805)640-9040. This peaceful, private garden contains lovely water features and blooming plants from Australia and South Africa. We should see early Spring migrants such as tanagers and orioles and plenty of hummingbirds, possibly Costa's hummingbirds! Due to lack of parking, carpooling is required (NO EX-CEPTIONS) and this trip is limited to 20 people. The registration deadline is Monday, April 4. To register, call Karin at (805)901-2203 or email karinkersteter@gmail.com and provide your name and phone number. For carpooling from Ventura, meet at 7:45 a.m. behind Carrows, located in the Vons Shopping Center at the corner of Harbor and Seaward. We will caravan to the garden. To carpool from Ojai, meet at 8:10 a.m. at the Vons at the corner of the 33 and 150 and park in the spots next to the 33. Directions (from Ventura): Hwy 33 to Baldwin Rd/Hwy 150,turn left. Proceed 2.3 miles and turn right at the cluster of mailboxes on a hard to see, unmarked private road (it is 1/2 mile past the better marked Ranch Rd.) Drive another 1/2 mile on the private road and meet at the large white wall with a paved pull out.

Saturday, April 16, 8:30 a.m. Santa Clara River Estuary/Surfers Knoll. Leader: Alexis Frangis (805)217-4833. We hope to see a variety of shorebirds including Snowy Plovers, Ruddy and Black Turnstones and hopefully Surfbirds. We may get some arriving phalarope, which are always an exciting treat. We will also tackle some gull and tern identification, so bring your field guides! Directions: Take Harbor Blvd to Spinnaker and enter Ventura Harbor. Follow Spinnaker as it curves around to the right. Surfers' Knoll is on the left. Please bring scopes if you have them. We will be walking a good distance on sand, so please wear appropriate footwear and plan on dressing in layers.

Tuesday, April 19, 8:30 a.m. Lake Casitas. Leader: Adele Fergusson (805)415-4304. Join us on a nice walk at the lake, looking for early Spring migrants. We may see Rufous Hummingbirds, grosbeaks and orioles, as well as ducks, geese and waterfowl. **Directions:** Take Hwy 33 towards Ojai; exit Casitas Vista Rd. Turn rt. and go under freeway past Foster Park to 1st rt., Santa Ana Rd. Follow to park. Or take Hwy 33 to Hwy 150, turn left and follow signs to the lake. Park and meet out front and we will walk in.

Saturday & Sunday, April 23-24. Spring weekend trip to Eastern Sierra Bishop area. Leader: Matthew Page. Stunning scenery and amazing birds are sure to make this trip memorable. Please email Karin at karinker-steter@gmail.com if you would like more information or to reserve your spot for this trip. Pre-registration is required. Plan on driving up on Friday April 22, as we will be starting early Saturday morning! Hope to see you there!

Saturday, April 30, 8:30 a.m. Camino Real Park. Leader: Raeanne Koerner (805)701-1919. Camino Real is a grassy park surrounded by pines and eucalyptus and is an excellent Spring migrant hotspot. Target birds will include Pacific-slope Flycatcher, Yellow Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, Western Tanager and Black-headed Grosbeak, but any number of cool warblers show up at this park during migration! Note directions: We will meet outside the park and walk in. Take Telegraph Road toward Ventura College. Across from Ventura College, turn onto Estates, take a right on Aurora, go to the grass beltway across from the mobile home park. Park closest to the last house in the residential tract. We will start birding along the barranca and go into the park. This trip will end promptly at 11 a.m.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED...

CALIFORNIA BROWN PELICAN ROOST

AND COASTAL ACCESS POINT SURVEY

MAY 7, 2016 (5:00-7:00 PM)

This year, Audubon California, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, eBird and state wildlife agencies are sponsoring a statewide Brown Pelican survey. We are looking for Audubon chapter members who would like to participate in the survey. If you would like to volunteer, please contact alexisraehamilton@gmail.com or 805-217-4833.

In 2016, Audubon California, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, state wildlife agencies, and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's eBird are collaborating to initiate a biannual survey of the California Brown Pelican subspecies (*Pelecanus occidentalis californicus*). This iconic bird was removed from the Endangered Species List in 2009 after decades of successful conservation efforts. In recent years, however, this subspecies has experienced poor breeding success and unusual mortality events, raising questions about its conservation status. It is more critical than ever to track the distribution, abundance, and population structure of Brown Pelicans as their ocean and coastal environment changes. Of highest importance in the survey are observations of pelicans at known roosts, as they are ideal places for citizen scientists to reliably report on the numbers and ages of pelicans. Pelicans at roosts will be counted, aged, and photographed. Data will be reported through a special portal set up in eBird. In addition to roosts, participants can report observations at other coastal access points within the same time frame.

BIRDERS OF ALL SKILL LEVELS NEEDED

Vanderbilt University is looking for birders of all levels of experience to participate in a project examining how perception and memory for birds differs between beginners and experts. We really do mean all levels of experience, from the true beginner to the expert with decades of study, and everything in-between.

These experiments are online on the web. They measure your ability to remember and identify birds and sometimes other animals or objects. Many experiments are

fairly short. They can be done on any computer, wherever and whenever you decide to do them.

One of our current experiments is a bird identification test. Go online and test your birding skills.

Once you register your own login id and password on the site, and complete a short survey of your birding expertise, you will be able to participate in any experiments that are available. We expect to add new experiments over time. Some future experiments may include modest compensation.

BEACHES ARE HABITTAT -SHARE OUR SHORE!



The Ventura Audubon sponsored event was held March 12th at the CSUCI Boating Center in Channel islands Harbor. About fifty people attended, many from the Hollywood Beach and Channel Islands area. They heard four excellent

presentations. Dr. Clare Steele from CSUCI spoke of beach and dune ecology providing background and vocabulary on the natural processes that form beaches and dunes. She also spoke of the threats to beach ecosystems as a result of the "hand of man". Tom McCormick talked about what happens when the ecosystem is thrown out of balance and what can be done to restore the natural balance

With an understanding of beach and dune ecology in mind, Alexis Frangis told how the endangered California least tern and the threatened western snowy plover make use of this environment.



Uniquely adapted to life on the beach, these birds nest on the beaches of Ventura County and are very much in need of our help. An Environmental Scientist, she manages the western snowy plover and California least tern nesting program for the Channel Islands District of State Parks.



The final speaker, Debra Barringer has been the biologist contracted to monitor WSP and CLT at Hollywood Beach for several years. She spoke of the unique challenges these birds face at Hollywood Beach because of intense human activity. She also spoke of the poten-

tial opportunity to remove invasive beach grass from some of the remaining dunes in the area near the harbor entrance and restore a more natural dune and beach habitat.

A question and answer session followed each presentation and tabletop displays by TNC, USFWS, CSUCI and Ventura Audubon provided additional learning opportunities. Several attendees volunteered for docent training and service. We received a lot of positive feedback on the program.
